

2025 Session in Summary

This year there were more than 1440 bills and resolutions filed, and 162 bills and resolutions passed; a thirty and eight tenths' percent (30.8%) decrease in bills enacted from 2024. There were twenty-four bills vetoed by Governor Beshear and all twenty-four vetoes were overridden by the Kentucky General Assembly. There is interesting statistical information after the bill summaries to show how the Session ended, by the numbers.

Bills that impact the banking industry are summarized below. If a bill contains more than one subject, only the portion that impacts banks is summarized. 1. HB1 – Income Tax Rates.

The Kentucky General Assembly reduced the individual income tax rate from 4% to 3.5% beginning January 1, 2026.

2. <u>HB2</u>– Taxation of Currency and Bullion.

Currency and gold bullion shall be exempt from sales tax retroactive to August 1, 2024.

3. <u>HB4</u> – Administrative Regulations.

After March 31, 2025, an administrative body shall not file or promulgate, or have power or authority to promulgate, any new administrative regulation unless expressly permitted by statutory authority.

4. <u>HB10</u> – Real Property Owner Rights.

Create a new section of KRS Chapter 383 to allow a property owner or his or her authorized agent to request a law enforcement officer to immediately remove a "squatter" with criminal and civil penalties.

5. HB15 – Instruction Permits.

Allows for those 15 or older to attain a driver's instructional permit.

6. <u>HB160</u> – Manufactured Housing.

Prevents a local government from discriminating against manufactured housing or excluding manufactured housing from planning and zoning so long as it meets the standard of other single-families residential structures in the same zone.

7. <u>HB210</u> – Dental Benefit Plans.

Allows dental insurance plans to pay out of network providers directly at insured rates upon consumer consent.

8. <u>HB233</u> – Property and Casualty Insurance.

Allows consumers to cancel a real estate services contract within ten days if the contract is not covered by insurance. Disallows an insurer from placing a mechanic's lien on property for charges over the amount paid, or expected to be paid, by an insurer.

9. HB315 Agricultural Land.

Prevents foreign adversaries from purchasing agricultural land. Property purchased by foreign adversaries is subject to escheatment to the state with the Office of the Attorney General to be reimbursed for its reasonable costs of litigation as determined by the Court.

10. HB342 – Financial Literacy.

Requires public schools to require one financial literacy course prior to high school graduation.

11. <u>HB390</u> – Motor Vehicle Insurance Database.

Creates an online database for car insurance verification.

12. <u>HB473</u> – Consumer Data Privacy in Healthcare.

Exempts healthcare data maintained according to HIPPA from Kentucky Revised Statutes data requirements.

13. HB544 – Disaster Relief.

Creates a state fund for funding emergencies. Local government, nonprofits, state agencies and school districts may receive funds for disaster relief.

14. <u>HB644</u> – Automated Speed Enforcement Devices.

The state may issue traffic citations utilizing an automated speed enforcement device in a work zone where at least one worker is present.

15. HB701 – Block Chain Assets.

Permits Kentucky residents to utilize a digital wallet and use digital assets for the payment or services but does not require anyone to accept digital assets for the payments of goods or services.

16. <u>SB3</u> – NIL.

Student-athletes may receive a "prevailing range of compensation" commensurate with similarly situated athletes. Institutions shall not be responsible for failure to attain NIL contracts.

17. <u>SB4</u> – Artificial Intelligence.

Creates a framework for the Commonwealth Office of Technology to establish policies for the ethical use of AI and data protection. Addresses the synthetic use of AI. This bill is primarily limited to the public sector.

18. <u>SB23</u> – Administrative Regulations.

Requires state agencies proposing an administrative regulation to appear, make a good faith effort to answer questions and provide data to support the proposed regulation. Sets new hearing requirements.

19. SB28 – Agricultural Economic Development.

Creates the agricultural economic development board with incentives for agriculture.

20. <u>SB129</u> – Tax Bills.

Tax bills purchased by a third-party and placed on a payment plan may be repurchased by the county.

Creates penalties for tampering with a gift card.
